Research in Progress

• Cross-Community Networks in Commons Governance: Developing a theory of structural fit to explain how weak, bridging ties across communities shape cooperation in managing shared resources. Current research In Uganda shows that while such networks can generate conservation gains, they may also heighten conflict, exclusion, and legitimacy concerns.

- Regime Security Environmentalism: Advancing a framework to analyze environmental policies not only as responses to ecological or security threats, but also as instruments to protect ruling regimes from domestic political challenges. Empirical work on Uganda's militarized fisheries highlights this logic and connects it to broader patterns in global environmental politics.
- Standardized Metrics of Coercive Environmentalism: Designing a comparative tool to quantify coercive
 approaches across regions and sectors, enabling cross-national rankings based on equity and participatory
 principles in environmental governance.
- Ethical Dimensions of Coercive Environmentalism: Expanding theoretical and normative frameworks to explore questions of justice and legitimacy in coercive environmental governance, both domestically and internationally.
